LEARNING CIRCLE ON CIVIL SOCIETY ACTION PROGRAM

In the month of June 2019, the CNFO board members participated in three (3) exciting and productive online learning circles. The learning circle is a mechanism for organizing and honouring the collective wisdom of a group and is present in many indigenous cultures.

In collaboration with the Caribbean Natural Recourses Institute (CANARI) the learning circles were held on June 13, 20 and 27 and were facilitated by CNFO Program Coordinator Mr. Mitchell Lay. The CNFO board members were invited to learn about the "2018-2030 Civil **Society Action Program for the** Sustainable management of the Shared Living Marine **Resources of the Caribbean and** the North Brazil Shelf Lage Marine Ecosystems (CLME+ C-SAP).

Some of the issues identified by the CNFO were ocean grabbing, climate change, marketing, high cost of fuel and fishing equipment, IUU fishing and the need for capacity development.

At the next CNFO board meeting (August 2019) the board will decide if the C-SAP will be endorsed.

Mr. Adrian LaRoda (Bahamas) Deputy Chair of the CNFO was welcoming members to a CNFO online meeting when he informed of a very tragic and horrific shark incident that took the life of a young California lady vacationing in the Bahamas. This happened on 26th June 2019 when the lady was on a snorkelling expedition in approximately five feet of water when she was attacked by three (3) sharks. He mentioned that this and several attacks of shark on humans have awakened discussions to relax the shark laws. Bahamas is the only country in the region with a complete ban on the harvesting of sharks. The CNFO prayed for the family of the young lady.

New nets make shrimp trawling more sustainable in Latin America and Caribbean

The FAO is conducting the project, known as The Sustainable Management of Bycatch in Latin America and Caribbean Trawl Fisheries (REYBAC LAC II), between 2015 and 2020 with the intention of meeting international guidelines for the responsible management of bycatch. With the help of traditional and large-scale fishers, the project consists of testing net prototypes that reduce the negative effects of trawling on marine biodiversity while still catching shrimp.

DOMINICA NEWS

<u>FISHERS MEET PRIME</u> <u>MINISTER</u>

June 27, 2019 Dominica fishers. including those from Roseau Central, were present at a meeting with some government officials including the Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit (P.M.) and officials from the fisheries division. Fishers spoke about the high cost of gas. The P.M said that it is very difficult to make any adjustments to the gas price. The P.M further mentioned that he wanted to assist fishers with boats as the fishers are trying to recover post Hurricane Maria. Short-term plan includes two fishers to receive 25-foot boats with 40 HP engines each. The Minister of Fisheries commented that the government has to be cautious when donating boats because of a human trafficking issue in Dominica. The fishers were concerned about this comment. More assistance was promised to the fishers including the issuing of more boats.

BREAKING NEWS

The National Fisherfolk Organisation of Saint Lucia has made several attempts to get information on who are the new managers of the Fish Market. Saint Lucia news reported that Lucian Blue Ocean Seafoods Inc, is a recently formed private company that assumed operations of the Fish Marketing Corporation (FMC) in April. The company's managing director, Mr. Hilary Herman said they have been operating the entity without a final lease agreement.

CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION OF THE FISHERIES SECTOR IN THE EASTERN CARIBBEAN PROJECT (CC4FISH)

<<<<<<>> SUBJECT: IT'S HURRICANE SEASON – KNOW HOW TO REPORT DAMAGES

It's Hurricane Season again. And you can report damages after an emergency!

An emergency like a hurricane brings high-speed winds, sea surge, and flooding. These can cause damages to belongings such as boats, gear, equipment, homes and other belongings.

Fisheries Early Warning and Emergency Response (FEWER) provides reporting for these instances of damages and can be used to view reports by other fishers. Functions of the module include:

o Viewing reports by Country

Making private reports

- o Make reports by category
- o Adding information like cost
- o Share a report to other apps

View damage reports on your Android phone when you get the **FEWER app** from the <u>Google</u> <u>Play Store</u>. You can access the reports in the <u>Damage Reporting module</u> in the app. Register in the app to make reports.

Keep track of your damages using the FEWER application.

FEWER and fishers' cell phones are companions to the VHF radio and GPS that together provide information and communications for safer fishing trips.
