CNFO NEWS: The CNFO presented its Regional Code at the CRFM Fisheries Forum (2021) and was endorsed by the Ministerial Council in May 2021.

CNFO is actively promoting the implementation of the Caribbean Community Common Fisheries Policy (CCCFP) and the Voluntary Guidelines for Securing Sustainable Small-Scale Fisheries in the Context of Food Security and Poverty Eradication (the SSF Guidelines).

2020-2021 has brought many challenges to fisherfolk in the Caribbean region. Relating to the COVID-19 pandemic in many instances government's initial response failed to take into consideration the needs and importance of small-scale fisheries.

Climate change and associated impacts, including sargassum influx, have arrested the attention of the network.

Conservation NGOs continue to push foreign agendas and this type of move needs to be carefully considered and responded to by fisherfolk.

St. Vincent and Grenadines 'Fish waste'-Waste or an untapped reservoir?

Waste occurs at every point in the fish value chain. These include guts, skins, frames, heads, shells and in some cases, whole fish and bycatch. By the time the fish gets onto the consumer's plates, between 15 to 70% of fish byproducts can be generated. Unfortunately, most of these unutilised byproducts are often dumped in the sea, resulting in both environmental and economic ramifications.

As a part of the "Establishing a sustainable fish waste management and utilisation drive through capacity building in the fisherfolk community" project, also known as the fish waste project, the NFO facilitated two workshops. These workshops demonstrated fish composting and fish silage production. Representatives from various fisherfolk co- operatives and other fisheries sector stakeholders were present.

The Caribbean Natural Resources management institute(CANARI) and the Centre for Resource and Environmental Studies(CERMES) Management financed the fish waste project under the Global Environmental Facility (GEF) funded StewardFish project.

We believe it is a small step in the right direction towards protecting our vulnerable ecosystem. The project sought to sensitise fisherfolk and the consuming public about the adverse effects of fish waste on our vulnerable marine environment and alternative uses for this valuable resource.






SAINT LUCIA
