Congratulations to the women for putting together this forum, where, just as we did in Brazil, we can come together as women to talk about common issues and how we can overcome them.

I daresay that the support role is just as important as the extraction. Most women fall there as vendor and the domestic support role. We have to continue realizing and recognizing the important role that women play.

Caribbean women, women in most of the CNFO member states, are very involved in the fishing sector as there are few to no barriers to entry. Women are boat owners, fishers, and vendors, although in the minority. Most of our fishing is still done in small vessels that do not have toilet facilities, for example, making it difficult for women to function in, and tradition has it that men are the dominant ones in the sector at that level. However, women are in management and leadership roles. I can identify two examples: in Barbados and Saint Lucia, the Chief Fisheries Officers are both women, and the cooperatives and associations are dominated by women. The tackle and lure shops are predominantly women, extension officers. So there is a platform for women to be actively involved in the fishing sector.

We have a responsibility as women to ensure that we leave an enviable footprint behind for the incoming generation and to make space for those behind us.

We know that it's not the same in all WFFP jurisdictions, but we are willing and open to sharing our stories of resilience and courage to encourage other women all over the world to get to the point where they can actively partake alongside the men. #### About SSF Guidelines

Tenure rights in small-scale fisheries
Small-scale fishers need secure and stable access to fishing grounds. They also need access to other resources like land so they can bring fish ashore, have a place to process fish, and, not least, have a place to live.

Without recognized rights, there is the risk that competing economic interests from other users of the water and land, such as tourism, power production, industrial fishing or other interests can push small-scale fishing communities aside.



#### **CNFO/CRFM UPDATES**

The CNFO asked that at the next Ministerial Council, the Ministers responsible for fisheries consider the CNFO/CRFM Small-scale Fisheries Action Plan 2023 – 2025: Contributing to Achieving the 25% Reduction in the Caribbean Community Food Bill by 2025.

#### Voluntary Guidelines for Securing Sustainable Small-Scale Fisheries

in the context of Food Security and Poverty Eradication

#### Value chains, postharvest and trade

Involve post-harvest actors in the decision-making process. Stress the role of women. Infrastructure and technology investments, value-added activities, and post-harvest loss and waste reduction.

#### GOVERNANCE OF TENURE

Secure equitable tenure rights to fishery resources and coastal land. Sustainable resource management including co-management.

#### Social development, employment and decent work

Address issues such as education, health services, financial services, social protection, public infrastructure, and other public services.

Health and safety; measures to improve safety at sea.

#### Gender equality

Improve gender equality in the entire value chain. Equal participation of women in decision-making, mainstreaming gender issues.

#### DISASTER RISK AND CLIMATE CHANGE

Develop policies, strategies for climate change adaptation and mitigation, and emergency response and disaster preparedness.





Strengthening the science-policy interface: sharing of knowledge and supporting policy reform


A strengthened knowledge base that informs a policy reform within a human rights context.


