Caribbean Fisherwomen Shine at World Forum of Fisher Peoples First Global Fisherwoman's Assembly in Thailand

HAT YAI, THAILAND – Eight Women leaders from the Caribbean Network of Fisherfolk Organisations (CNFO) played a pivotal role at the inaugural World Forum of Fisher Peoples (WFFP) 1st Global Fisherwoman's Assembly held here from August 7-17. The delegation, attending the open sessions from August 13-16, brought a powerful Caribbean voice to the global stage.

Throughout the event, delegates engaged in critical discussions about the challenges facing fisherwomen, including the impacts of industrialization, coastal development, and climate change. A key session was dedicated to formulating a policy on harassment and discrimination, with participants discussing whether to create a general policy or one focused specifically on sexual harassment.


Poem: Sisters of the Caribbean Sea (Partial poem)

About SSF Guidelines

Participatory management

The SSF Guidelines also provide guidance on the need for sustainable fishing practices that do the least harm to the environment and the fish. States are encouraged to prevent and stop all illegal and destructive fishing practices, avoid overfishing, and put in place systems for monitoring, control and surveillance (MCS). Small-scale fishers are, in turn, encouraged to support and uphold such MCS systems.

CNFO & SSF Guidelines:

- Developing and implementing an advocacy campaign to address identified
 fisheries challenges in three CNFO member states, in the context of implementing
 the SSF Guidelines (Anguilla 8th, 10th, and 15th March 2022); (Jamaica 13th,
 16th, and 30th June 2022); and St. Kitts and Nevis 24th, 25th August and 22nd
 September 2022). (FAO supported)
- Turks and Caicos SSF Guidelines Workshop April 10-11, 2025. (Collaboration CSFUND/TIDES, Fisherfolk Organisations and national partners)

GOVERNANCE OF TENURE

Secure equitable tenure rights to fishery resources and coastal land. Sustainable resource management including co-management.

Social development, employment and decent work

Address issues such as education, health services, financial services, social protection, public infrastructure, and other public services.

Health and safety; measures to improve safety at sea.

Gender equality

Improve gender equality in the entire value chain. Equal participation of women in decision-making, mainstreaming gender issues.

DISASTER RISK AND CLIMATE CHANGE

Develop policies, strategies for climate change adaptation and mitigation, and emergency response and disaster preparedness.





Strengthening the science-policy interface: sharing of knowledge and supporting policy reform


A strengthened knowledge base that informs a policy reform within a human rights context.
